Student nurse placement



Bramble Down and Cornerways have been delighted to join the Clinical Placement Expansion Project (CPEP), which aims to increase nursing and allied health professional (AHP) student placement capacity within Devon's primary and social care services.

The pilot saw us hosting the first student nurse in Devon to complete their placement in both a nursing home and residential home. It has been a challenging project for the CPEP team, as they have had to ensure the Nursing Midwifery Council were happy with the placement, but we know the student nurse has loved her time with us.

We hope that the blended adult nursing degree programme will continue in 2023 and we will continue to host student nurses during their training.

Thank you to Amy, our student nurse, and to the teams at both Bramble Down and Cornerways for making her so welcome.

Training update

We've had a busy training calendar over the autumn, with Moving & Handling practical training sessions taking place across all of the homes.

In response to feedback from our staff survey, we've introduced a more supportive approach to one-to-ones, replacing 'Supervisions' as they were previously known. Staff from Bramble Down and Cornerways attended a half day workshop from City College on Reflective Practice, which is at the heart of our one-to-ones. This workshop will be delivered in our other homes in 2023.

We've also updated our induction process, which has been well received. Gary, our Training Manager, has helped to welcome a number of new team members.

Managers of each home and the central support team met recently met to review all our competencies, which support our staff training. This will be ready to relaunch in the new year.

Our Training Manager Gary Hitching has written a book! This records his experiences throughout a career that has included serving as a member of the military in Afghanistan, and working for the Royal Family. 'Run They Said: Poetry of a Fortunate Airman' is available now on Amazon.

- ⇒ We're looking at a new electronic rota system that will help staff see when they are on duty and offer a better link with our payroll supplier.




