
Welcome to the Spring 2023 issue of Peninsula News.

New service at Plymbridge



We've been fortunate to receive access to Immedicare, funded by OneDevon. The Immedicare service provides 24/7 virtual access to NHS clinical assessors who carry out assessments to determine whether a person requires a GP visit, if a hospital admission or visit by the local nursing team is needed, or whether the case can be dealt with remotely by the Immedicare team. This has a proven track record of being incredibly effective at reducing pressure on local NHS services.

come together to attend training delivered by RNIB (Royal National Institute of Blind People). Staff learnt so much about how sight loss can impact the lives of people living with dementia, how dementia itself can affect a person's sight and how best to communicate with people with sight loss.

The RNIB have also developed a series of audio resources specifically for Peninsula Care Homes, which support staff to gain a greater understanding of different eye conditions.

Our collaboration with the RNIB continues with some exciting development opportunities planned for staff over the next few months.

Competency assessments

We have been updating our competency assessments, which are a vital tool for helping our staff provide consistent, high-quality care.

These help us understand training needs in individuals and groups, so that we can put in place the right development and support for our care teams. They cover a broad range of key care activities, from supporting the mobility of those we care for, to infection control and more specialised skills, such as the management of medication.

In brief

- ⇒ Bramble Down and Cornerways are building on the success of their recent student nurse placements. The programme last year saw the first student nurse placement in a residential and nursing home. We're delighted to report that both homes will be welcoming further student nurses over the next few months.
- ⇒ We have co-designed a workshop on Reflective Practice in partnership with LearnDevon. This is part of our teams' development support and helps us celebrate successes and improve on areas that need attention.

All staff were invited to complete a survey in January, asking for their feedback on pay and benefits. We were delighted to receive 185 responses – our highest response to a survey ever.
